PRAYER OF CONFESSION

(based on Mark 6:14-29)

The biblical account of the death of John the Baptist reminds us of the riskiness of standing for Your truth and justice. Threat of imprisonment did not stop John from preaching his message of repentance, even to a king.

It is unlikely in this place and time that we would face imprisonment or death for sharing the Gospel story or calling out untruths and injustices. Yet, some element of risk remains. And so, we pray.
